



Child Population, 2010





Child Poverty Defined, 2018

Poverty level

- \$20,231 for a family of 3
- \$25,465 for a family of 4

Extreme poverty level

- \$10,116 for a family of 3
- \$12,733 for a family of 4

2018 Rhode Island Standard of Need

Single-parent family with 2 children would need \$55,115 a year to meet its basic needs, which would require a pre-tax income of \$62,844 to meet this budget without governmental subsidies.




Children in Poverty, by Race and Ethnicity, Rhode Island, 2013-2017

Homeless Children


 In 2018, 403 families with 653 children stayed in a homeless shelter or a domestic violence shelter in RI.

 During the 2017-2018 school year, Rhode Island public school personnel identified 1,539 children as homeless.

 Woonsocket Public Schools personnel identified 129 children as homeless.






In 2018...

- 40 Woonsocket babies were born to teen mothers.
- 95 Woonsocket babies were born to mothers without a high school diploma.
- 315 Woonsocket babies were born to single mothers.
- 343 Woonsocket babies were born in low-income families.






589 Woonsocket children due to enter kindergarten in the fall of 2020 were tested.




Juveniles Referred to Family Court

Youth Referred to Family Court




Of the 4,403 wayward and delinquent offenses for which youth were referred to Family Court in 2018,
 5% were for violent crimes.

Youth at the Training School



- 68% decline in youth in the care and custody of the Training School from 2009 to 2018 after a cap was placed on the population in July 2008.
- 17 youth in the care and custody of the Training School in 2018 were from Woonsocket.




On September 30, 2018:

- 95 incarcerated parents with a known in-state residence identified Woonsocket as their last place of residence.
- These parents reported 217 children.
- Only Providence and West Warwick have higher rates of children with incarcerated parents.


Child Abuse and Neglect



- Woonsocket's child abuse and neglect victim rate is the highest in the state.
- In Rhode Island in 2018, the vast majority (80%) of child abuse and neglect victims experience neglect.



High Quality Early Learning Programs






In Woonsocket:

- 100% of the 9 child care centers and preschools participate in BrightStars.
 - > 44% (4 of 9) have a high-quality rating of 4 or 5 stars
- 100% of 6 family child care homes participate in BrightStars.
 - So far, none have a high-quality rating of 4 or 5 stars

Head Start and State Pre-K



 51% of all children and 57% of low-income children in Woonsocket were enrolled in either Head Start or State Pre-K during the year before kindergarten, much higher than the state rates.


Child Care Subsidies

- In December 2018, there were 10,391 child care subsidies in Rhode Island, up 4% from December 2017, but down 28% from the 2003 peak.
- 733 Woonsocket children from ages birth to 12 receive a subsidy for child care.

K-12 Students Receiving Special Education Services



- In Woonsocket, 25% of children in grades K-12 are receiving special education services, the highest rate in the state.
- In Woonsocket, 12% of children ages 3 to 5 receive preschool special education services, higher than the state rate of 8%.


Third-Graders Meeting Expectations in English Language Arts, 2018




Chronic Early Absence

In Woonsocket, 24% of K-3 students missed 18+ days of school during the 2017-2018 school year, tied for the second highest percentage in the state.


Chronic Absence, Middle School & High School

School Suspensions



- During the 2017-2018 school year, 100% of Woonsocket's suspensions were out-of-school suspensions, compared to 56% in the state as a whole.
- Woonsocket's overall suspension rate was the same as the state as a whole, but its out-of-school suspension rate was 15 per 100 students, compared to the state rate of 8 per 100 students.

^{*}Harassment offenses include hazing and hate crimes. Assault offenses include sexual assault.

High School Graduation Rate, 2008-2018





College Access and Enrollment


